

How to booksnap – task sheet

Task: Create a visual representation that reflects your thinking on the book and shows how you connect with the book.

Follow these steps.

Step 1: Create a booksnap for a book/text you are reading and that you want to share. Have a dialogue with the text.

Step 2: Write a script for your presentation. This can be an explanation for your booksnap. Use the language support.

Step 3: Record your presentation. You can use a voice recorder app on your phone. Send your recording to your teacher to get feedback.

Step 4: Post your booksnap on our class padlet and get feedback from your classmates.

This is how you create your booksnap:

You need: your book/text, your smartphone, your imagination

Tip: You can create your booksnap using a photo editing app, e.g. PicCollage, Seesaw.

- Pick a passage** (*Abschnitt*): Choose a passage that you connect with/that speaks to you.
- Take a picture** of the text or the page or the passage.
- Edit your picture using text and pictures/images.**
- Highlight**, underline, or circle the part of the text with which you are connecting. Use the pencil icon to circle or highlight the lines that speak to you. Draw arrows to show connections.
- Add speech or thought bubbles** to show what you think of the text.
- Write:** Go to the T icon and type in your text. This can be a question or a comment.
- Add pictures:** You can add emojis, stickers or gifs. You can use emojis to show how a character feels or how you feel or how you reacted to the text.
- Save:** Save your booksnap in your photo gallery.

Here are some ideas:
